



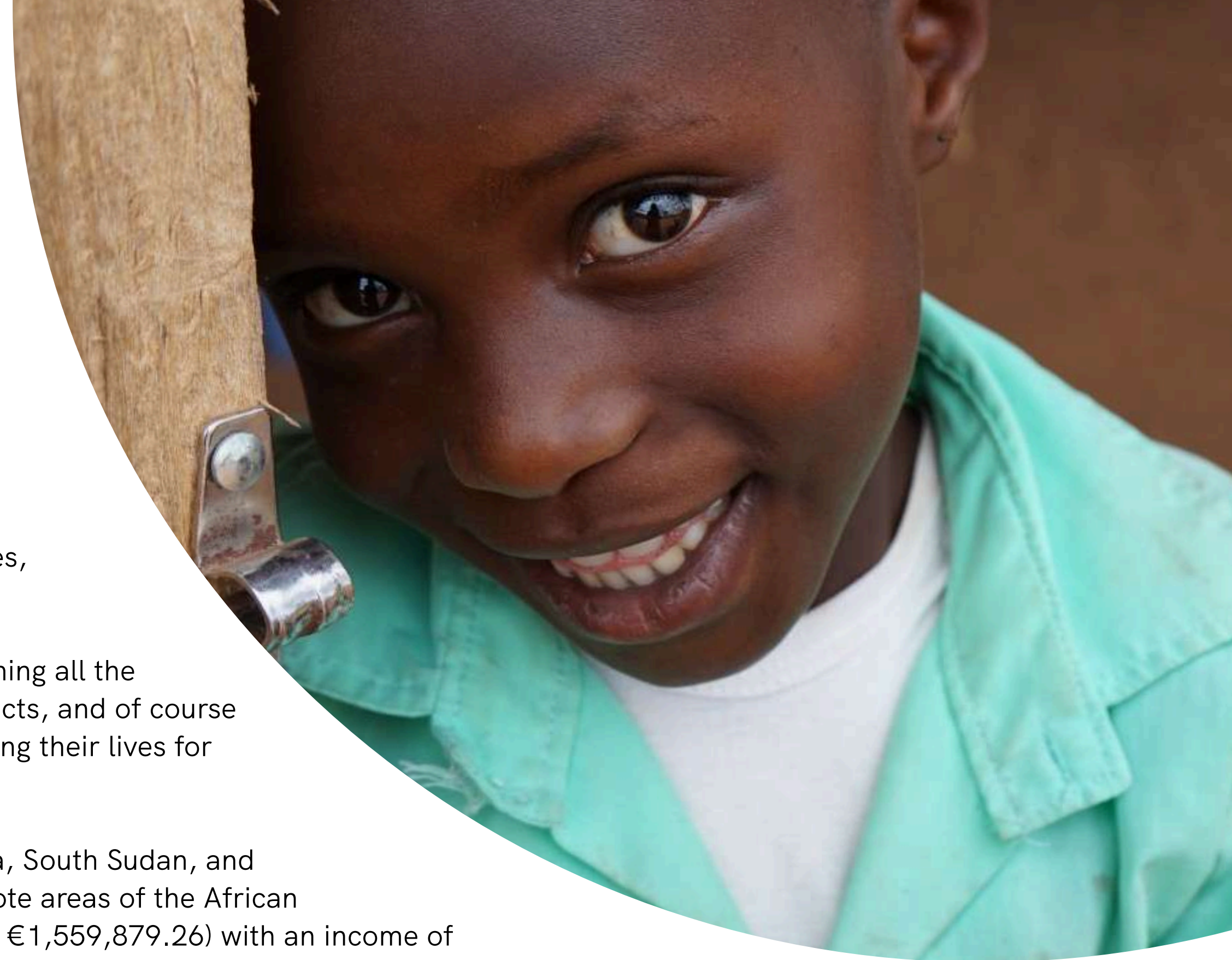

Letter from the Director



“In the evening of life, we will be judged on love alone” (*)

Dear FRIENDS, Partners, Sponsors, Volunteers, all benefactors of tens of thousands of families whose lives, without our help, would have many fewer opportunities, in some cases none at all...

Apart from the legacy we leave “in the evening of life”, we will first have donated many of our fruits, meaning all the generous help we give to África Directo or other causes. This includes our time, our knowledge, our contacts, and of course our hope for a more just world which we share with so many religious sisters in Africa who are in turn giving their lives for those most in need. Thank you very much for all the love and generosity shared!

In 2022 we have worked in 18 countries, mainly in Uganda, Tanzania, Mozambique, Madagascar, Ethiopia, South Sudan, and Malawi. Almost a hundred projects with more than 60 missionary partners scattered across the most remote areas of the African continent. The total amount of aid granted by the Foundation during 2022 exceeded €1.5 million (exactly €1,559,879.26) with an income of over €2 million (exactly €2,140,475.52).

After a couple of years immersed in a global pandemic which produced an unprecedented crisis in Spain (and many other donor countries), the consequences of which were visible in the African missions in which we were involved. 2022 finally arrived, a year in which life and work returned to normal. As a result, we were able to celebrate charity events again. We also travelled to our missions in Africa as usual, and life in Africa also returned to normal where, in countries such as Uganda, schools had been closed for almost two years. It is true that the effects of the war in Ukraine were also felt in terms of aid, but in our case, we received more contributions than ever from our donors with which we initiated numerous projects in 2022 (as listed in this report) and 2023 (the aid which arrived in the last months of the year will be dedicated to projects over the following year).

During 2022, I also toured Malawi and Zambia visiting projects we have been working on for 25 years. Among other things, I enjoyed seeing the latest changes at the Atupele Hospital- which means 'Gift of God'-, the health centre built by África Directo 20 years ago. Likewise, we have been able to carry out medical campaigns in many other countries (Cameroon or Ivory Coast), as well as aid programs for people with albinism, one example being the support group in Mozambique.

Once again, thank you very much for being part of this beautiful dream that, with your help, continues to ensure that 100% of funds donated reach those most in need through the full commitment shown by our community of people.

In our 2022 annual report, we want to **highlight some of the projects we have supported from the DMI congregation (The Society of Daughters of Mary Immaculate), throughout 2018 until 2022. África Directo has helped a total of 22 projects** in 5 African countries, **thanks to every one of you.** We have been collaborating with them since 2012 and every year they show us that they are able to go further to provide help to the most vulnerable.

DMI is a non-governmental, non-profit religious organization established in 1984 in India. It is well known for its excellence in social development activities for the empowerment of poor, oppressed and marginalized communities.

DMI runs medical clinics, and AIDS treatment centres for women, children and women empowerment groups, guarantees access to formal education for children and offers humanitarian help in countries affected by violence and natural disasters. For a long-lasting impact, DMI works jointly with non-specialists and experts in their field around the world, religion or race notwithstanding.

St. Joseph Hospital - Equipment & Toilets



Mbweni, Tanzania.



Background: The project intervention area, Mbweni, is a rural and remote area where 70% of the rural and unreached populations lack access to health care. In particular, pregnant women, newborn babies and sick people surrounding Mbweni do not have access to quality health care: prenatal care; postnatal care centers and other emergency care facilities. They go to witch doctors to deliver babies and end up losing their lives(). Most of the time they do not go to the hospital for treatment and follow their traditional beliefs and witchcraft to recover from their illness. In addition, these target communities very often fall sick with various diseases; Infant and maternal mortality is high in rural Mbweni due to lack of access to health care facilities and preventive measures. The Mbweni hospital team has sensitized local community members on the importance of health and access to basic health care during childbirth, antenatal and postnatal care.



The project: The hospital lacked some essential equipment to meet the needs of pregnant women, newborn babies and infants. And a toilet block was needed. These are the objectives that have been met with this project:

- Equipping the hospital with essential equipment such as patient monitor, lighting for operating theatre, delivery beds, patient beds, cribs, ventilators, laboratory equipment, and a washing machine.
- Build 5 bathrooms.
- Provide efficient and quality care to women and children, particularly pregnant women, newborn babies and infants.
- Support rural and remote communities' access to quality, low-cost medical care at the Mbweni hospital.

Bangui, CAR (Central African Republic).



Background: In Bangui, 65% of children do not have access to quality education and, despite the fact that it is free and obligatory for children aged between 6 and 14, the dropout rate is very high.

Accessing secondary education is not easy, which favors delinquency, child labor, human trafficking, and child marriage. The dropout rate is higher among girls (23%) due to social pressure to get married or the distance to the school. In addition to the lack of learning opportunities, the gap with respect to other regions widens in aspects such as nutrition, health or access to social protection. To improve this, the DMI team proposed the construction of a school to foster those children and give them a quality education at kindergarten and primary school.



The Project: classrooms will provide education for 2,000 children from preschool to primary school over the period of 5 years. Right now, a group of 300 children between 6 and 14 years old would formally enroll and receive basic education in English, mathematics, natural and social sciences. Each class will have a maximum number of 60 children. They will also receive training in social abilities, sports or games that enhance their confidence and self-esteem.

Project goals:

- Construction of a kindergarten and elementary school for 550 children each year.
- Improve the academic knowledge and abilities of these children.

This Project was supported by DaValor.

NOTE: In addition to the difficulties of working on the ground in armed conflict countries, where we can only be present thanks to the commitment, faith, and the enormous courage and generosity of Sister Amala and the other DMIs of her community, we also often encounter administrative problems. Banks often return the transfers we make to help them in countries like South Sudan or CAR as they are on special lists for money laundering, conflict, etc. This is the reason why, although this is a 2022 project whose funds were transferred in November that year, banks did not return us the transfer until December, and we were finally allowed to send the funds to the community of Sister Amala in January 2023, so it is a 2022 project that will actually be accounted for in 2023.

Gogrial, South Sudan.



Background: South Sudan is a country prone to war and natural disasters. Conflicts and disasters affect the lives of women, children and elderly communities and increase the adversity and difficulties they face in everyday life. Two-thirds of the country are currently affected by the floods caused by the effects due to the consequences of climate change. More than 900,000 people have been directly affected as floodwaters swept away homes and livestock, forced thousands to flee and flooding large areas of farmland, worsening an already severe food crisis.

In late August 2022, heavy rains caused extreme flooding throughout western Gogrial County, resulting in immense damage to homes and critical infrastructure in several communities. Over four hundred (400) families who were affected by the devastating floods have been displaced from Ayiel, Machar, Rooratok, Langic and Lili Kunu villages and have taken shelter in the DMI program areas in Gogrial Payam.



The project: DMI, with the support of África Directo, distributed food and non-food materials to more than 400 victim families. Four months later, with the help of África Directo, we have been able to:

- Reach about 400 flood victim families (4,795 people: women, children, teenagers, men and elderly) with disaster relief and recovery services.
- Provide a 20 kg ration kit for 400 families to receive food. The rations included Ugali flour, oil, beans, sugar, etc.
- Distribute 2 mosquito nets, 2 blankets and 2 mats to help families stay warm, sleep comfortably, and remain safe from mosquitoes and diseases like malaria, dengue etc.
- Providing almost 765 overnight stays in shelters and access to drinking water for family members.
- Providing rehabilitation services: counselling and crisis management disaster training to more than 2,600 people which improved their self-confidence and prepared them to handle any future catastrophes.

This project was made possible by DaValor with funding from C.J.A. which has already collaborated with many other África Directo projects.

Supporting a group of women farmers in Zambia



Chipata District, Zambia.



Background: Chipata District is located in Zambia's Eastern Province, where 85% of the population relies on agriculture as their main source of income, and depends on the monsoon for farming. In this district, the villages of Kagunda, Gondar, Chuni, Simoni and Hellen are situated 5 to 10 kilometers away, where smallholder farmers grow only maize and a very limited production of vegetable and fruit crops. The centrality of maize in their diet without a diverse diet affects health status and lacks nutrients. The deeply patriarchal norms in the family limit women's and adolescent girls' access to a balanced diet. There is a high prevalence of micronutrient deficiencies (MND) among girls and women.



The project: This initiative supported 89 out of 100 smallholder families in growing vegetables and fruits using the land they own for their consumption and to generate income. It addressed food insecurity and the nutritional needs of target smallholder families in Chipata. The project empowered women farmers to learn about home gardens and low-cost irrigation techniques for cultivation.

The target villages have fertile soils and access to water within a reasonable distance to enable them to produce vegetables and fruits in the future. By encouraging the cultivation of fruits and vegetables in their backyard, the project directly influences families to consume and improve household nutrition. In addition, it achieved:

- Created and fortified 5 women's groups, involving 100 women members.
- Provided training in accounting and small business management.
- Improved women's beneficiaries' knowledge and skills in agriculture and preparation of agricultural land, soil fertilization, and water management through drip irrigation systems.
- Supported women beneficiaries in preparing balanced meals and encouraged families to adopt nutritious diets.
- 90% of the women reported increased their self-confidence and self-esteem.

This project was made possible by the Open Value Foundation 2018.

Note: Although this project started in 2018, in 2022, we were fortunate to visit and witness the tangible fruits of the work carried out with these women and the ongoing benefits for their families.

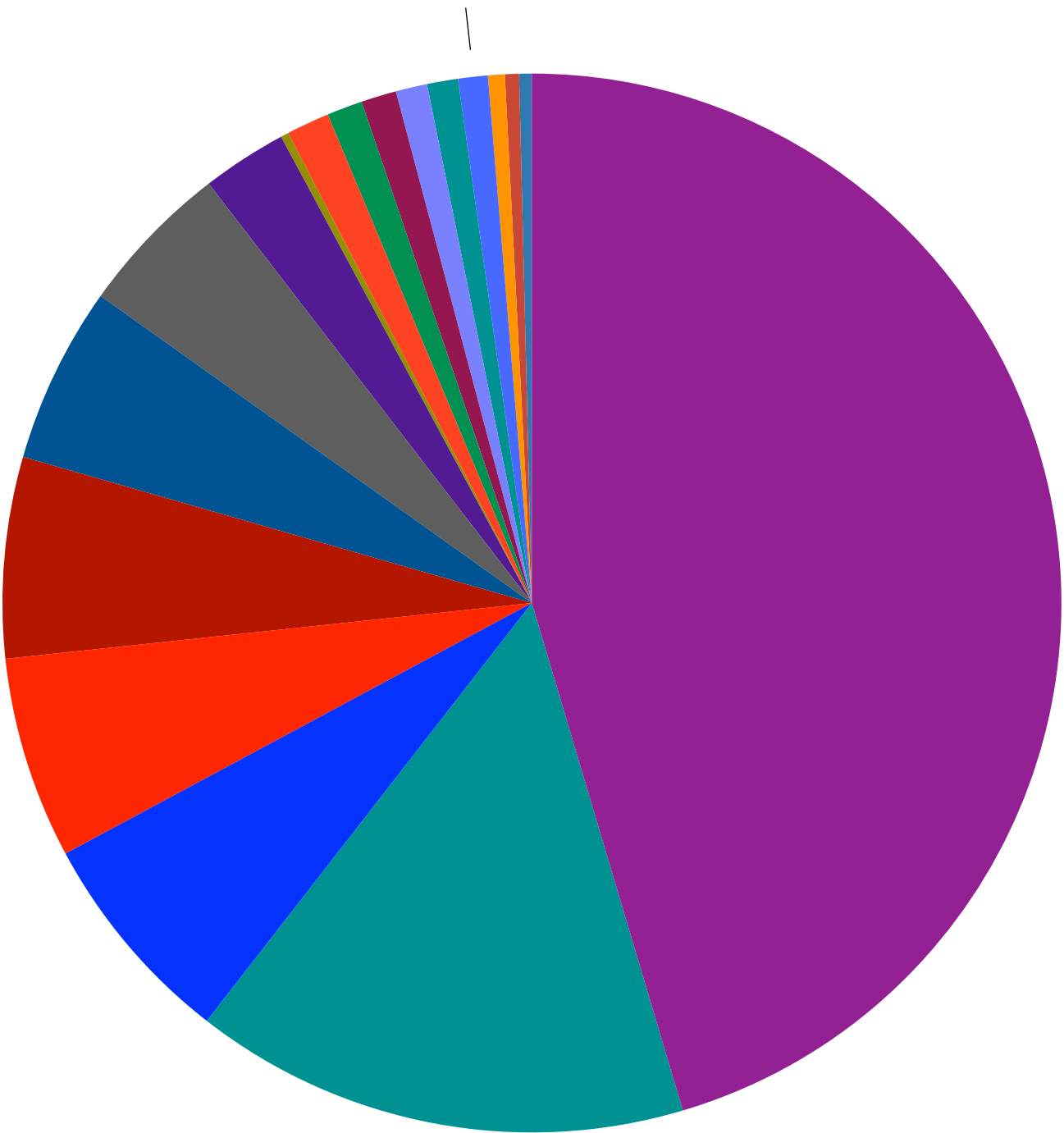

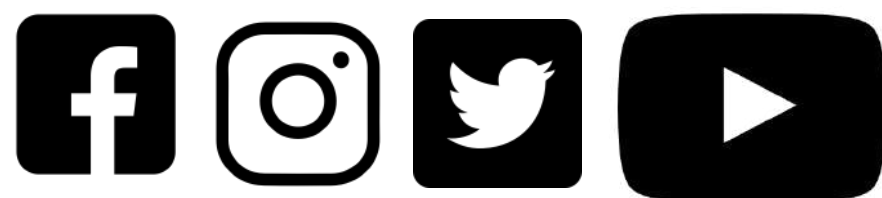
